# Musings from the Co-Chair

Anniversaries are funny things. Some are somber remembrances, while others are cause for happy celebration. Either way they often prompt us to pause and reflect upon who we are, where we're going, what we're doing right, and what needs to change. It is a good exercise, I think, to engage in some annual introspection. March not only brings the first day of Spring. It holds several meaningful points in time--



March 13, 2020, is the date that sticks in my mind as the last day of pre-COVID life. Although the virus had been present and spreading for many weeks, the tsunami of new reality didn't seem to actually reach our WY shores until then. March 13 was a Friday that year, and I left work that afternoon to begin spring break week, wondering how things might be different when we returned 10 days later. We didn't return to in-person work until that Fall. Those days in between were fraught with concern for students, frustration with tech devices, and the strange disconnect of working in a "team" while sitting alone in a home office.

March 2020 was also the time that the UUFL started taking steps to comprehensively protect the health and safety of our members and friends. I can't confidently recall when we first posted guidelines for masking or cleaning or attending in-person, but it feels like a very long time ago. I suspect that we each feel a similar great weariness; the longing to be together on Sundays reminds us each week what it means to be a church family.

March 17, 1996, was when I signed The Book, under the encouraging gaze of Rev. Alan Shaw, in the sunny winter glow of our pyramid-shaped UUFL building. I can even recall what I was wearing. Previously, I couldn't imagine wanting to join any religious organization. Now 26 years later I can't imagine my life without UU/ UUFL/ you.

My life began on March 14, 1965. Speeding onward with another year completed, it does me good to consider the anniversaries in the calendar of my own life. With the promise of Spring renewal just ahead, these anniversaries remind me of my connection to time and history, to people and place, to the stardust in matter and the music of the spheres. This interdependent web existed eons before me and stretches ahead toward infinity; I am blessed and lucky to be here in this moment with you.

## Building Use Policy updated December 1, 2021

As we face the new Omicron variant of the coronavirus, the Board will be constantly monitoring the transmission metrics in Albany County on the Wyoming Department of Health, the CDC, and the COVIDActNow websites. The UUFL COVID policy will be updated as necessary. Please keep tabs on our Facebook page and Website for any potential changes in our Sunday services and other activities.

### **Requirements:**

- 1. Users must wear masks or cloth facial coverings inside the building.
- 2. Users are responsible for cleaning tables, doorknobs, and bathroom surfaces with appropriate solvents.
- 3. There must be a gap of one hour between groups using the building.
- 4. A maximum of 20 household groups is allowed in the Sanctuary and no more than 12 people are allowed in the Social Hall.
- 5. While individuals may bring their own food or drink, food may not be prepared or served to groups without advance agreement by the Board.

#### **Exceptions:**

Speakers who are fully vaccinated and boosted and are actively engaged in leading religious services may remove their face covering so long as they maintain at least **twelve** (12) **feet distance** from non-household members indoors. Currently the only place in our sanctuary that is 12 feet or more from the nearest row of chairs is the pulpit.

#### **Recommendations:**

- 1. Please maintain a social distance of 6 feet or more.
- 2. The doors and windows should be opened for ventilation, weather permitting.

#### **Indoor Church Services and Meetings:**

We are allowing in-person services inside, but to protect those among us who might be vulnerable to infection, we continue to require masks or facial coverings <u>inside</u> the building. The Board will continue to monitor the advisability of indoor services and meetings as circumstances evolve.
