Minister's Musings

Because this autumn has been mild and the wind hasn't blown all the leaves off the trees yet, it's hard to believe November has arrived. Many Halloweens have been celebrated by trick-or- treaters bundled up in snow boots and mittens navigating slippery sidewalks and front porches. But this year, the official hazards of winter weather haven't appeared yet and we've all enjoyed more fall hikes, family outings, and footballs games without having to don arctic-weather coats and hats.



But winter is around the corner and the longer nights still beckon us to the traditional time of enjoying the indoors and introspection, especially members and friends who are committed to the wellbeing of UUFL. When Rev. Sarah Schurr was here a few weeks ago, her Sunday service and facilitation of the congregational meeting were an opportunity for collective pastoral care and conversation.

For those of us who were able to participate, we named and lifted up some of the traumatic experiences and shared pain UUFL has gone through these past several years. And while the purpose was not to dwell in the past, by naming and acknowledging a collective trauma, we honored the experiences and created a shared understanding that everyone has been impacted - individually and collectively. To name these experiences, is to weave them into the fabric of the historical story of UUFL. The experiences of the recent past are not what define us, but they are part of who we are and the lessons to be learned should be heeded as we look to the future.

Another important part of the conversation was learning the past couple of pandemic years have impacted all churches across the United States. Many of the larger congregations have more resources and volunteer capacity to weather something as far-reaching as a pandemic, while many of the smaller churches obviously do not -- and UUFL is no exception.

I have been blessed with the time to visit and deepen my relationships with many UUFL members and friends during my tenure as your minister. One of the most important things I've heard from so many of you is there is a deep commitment to keeping UUFL open, welcoming, vibrant, and a bastion of liberal religion in Laramie. But in too many ways, we are still struggling with events from the past and so are in need of a new conversation and a new sense of adventure.

As an eternal optimist, I believe in UUFL and in all of you. I also know it is important we not shy away from challenging our comfort zones and the lure of what has worked in the past. The pandemic changed everything and so, today, we have a unique opportunity to find ways to talk about the future and what we need to do as stewards of this liberal church community.

And, as a member of a progressive, change-engaged UUA, we are not alone. UUFL's membership in the UUA includes access to many wonderful, new, innovative ideas and strategies generated from the most recent generation of emerging leaders. One of my favorite mantras is, 'a good leader works themselves out of a job.' We are all leaders here at UUFL and it's time to get busy. See you in church!
